Workshop Description:

The word “Copyright” can cause concern and confusion for instructors when preparing and gathering course material for a course. What exactly is copyright? How do you know what resources you can use without violating copyright law? Where can you locate more information about copyright? This workshop will empower you to examine your rights as a copyright owner and user. Upon completion of the workshop you will have a better understanding of how to locate copyright-compliant resources and identify material to avoid. Finally, the workshop will expand your knowledge and skills about copyright in an educational institution.
